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What's It Like to LIVE with Food Allergies?


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- School**
 - More than 1/3 of children and teens with food allergies (ages 8-17), reported being bullied **specifically** because of their food allergies – usually by classmates.¹
- Social**
 - 40% of parents reported experiencing hostility from other parents when trying to accommodate their child's food allergy.²
- Relationships**
 - 1 in 4 parents report that food allergies causes a strain on their marriage.³
 - Mothers rated their own psychological and physical quality of life worse than fathers rated theirs, and had higher scores than fathers for anxiety and stress⁴
- Finances**
 - Caring for children with food allergies costs U.S. families nearly \$25 billion annually.⁵

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Common Challenges: Finances



The average yearly cost for a child with food allergies is \$4184.



About 1/3 of this budget is dedicated to buying allergy-friendly foods



Low-income families will spend 2.5 times as much on hospitalizations due to a lack of funds and access to specialty care, allergen-friendly foods and medication.



21% of children diagnosed with food allergies experience low food security

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Common Challenges: Finances



IMPACT ON FINANCES (N=457)

My family had to seek social assistance (housing, food)	29%
My family had to seek financial assistance (for example, a loan)	27%
My family incurred more debt (like credit card debt)	49%
My family declared bankruptcy	10%
It impacted my ability to get another job later	14%
We had to sell our house	2%
We had to sell our car	2%
Other	24%

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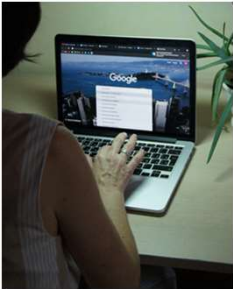

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Let's Examine the Evidence...

- 92% of allergy parents say they're always or occasionally fearful of their food allergic child's safety¹
- 75% of allergy parents reported that food allergies cause fear/anxiety for their family¹
- Greater maternal overprotection was associated with lower child QoL as well as greater dietary and social limitations independent of food allergy outcomes²

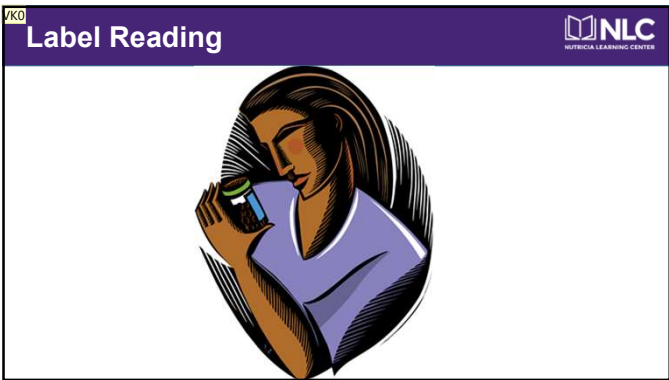
